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# 1. WHO WE ARE

## MISSION

The mission of FMSI is to promote innovative thinking and practical initiatives for the benefit of children and young people, especially those considered most vulnerable and neglected.

FMSI works to establish a better world for children where their rights are respected and protected, where they can grow and mature in safe and healthy environments, free from violence and fear, and where their future is bright and rich with opportunity.

FMSI – ONLUS was established with a specific purpose: to help make the world a better place for children and young people.

Inspired by the vision of St. Marcellin Champagnat and promoted by the Marist Brothers of the Schools, FMSI works in the fields of children’s rights and international solidarity. It was officially established in Italy as an ONLUS (a government recognized non-profit organization with a social purpose) in 2007. In 2011 FMSI was granted the Special Consultative Status with the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) of the United Nations.

FMSI has a primary focus on child rights. We seek to promote innovative thinking and practical initiatives for the benefit of children and young people, especially those considered most vulnerable and neglected. Its hope is to provide opportunities for children and young people to receive a meaningful education for the development of their full potential.

FMSI established an office in Geneva, Switzerland, home of the United Nations Human Rights Council. This gives it the opportunity to participate in relevant UN conferences, meetings and working groups dealing with child rights. By sharing in the expertise of an international Marist network, FMSI is able to engage in discussions and decisions on standards and international agreements dealing with the human rights of children and young people.

FMSI offers training programs in child rights, UN mechanisms and UN procedures to encourage its colleagues to become aware of and actively engaged in efforts to help improve the quality of life for children around the world.

FMSI Cono Sur office in Santiago (Chile) coordinates, with particular attention to the issue of children’s rights, the Foundation’s activities

in the Marist region of Cono Sur, which includes Argentina, Bolivia, Chile, Paraguay, Peru and Uruguay. The objectives of this office are related primarily to the implementation of strategies for the promotion

of the rights of children and adolescents in the Cono Sur countries, in dialogue with local government institutions and the UN delegations, through FMSI's special consultative status with the ECOSOC.

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## 2. ADVOCACY FOR THE RIGHTS OF THE CHILD AT THE UNITED NATIONS

### SEPTEMBER 12, 2014: Day of general discussion of the Committee on the Rights of the Child

The focus of the day was on “digital media and children’s rights”. The discussion offered many perspectives concerning the problems that affect children in the digital age. Some of the key themes that were emphasized or highlighted during the meeting:

- Governments, schools and parents need to find the balance between the protection and the empowerment of children;
- In digital media, children are frequently ignored or forgotten;
- There is a lack of relationship or connection between children and adults regarding the manner of understanding media: “children live in the world of technology, adults use the world of technology”.

Three key lines of action were developed concerning the empowerment of children:

- In digital media empowerment is of crucial importance to maximize the beneficial effects and minimize the harm or danger;
- This is only possible through a perspective that will include the sustained and constant collaboration of the many areas involved;
- It should be based on a balance between protection and participation, in such a way that children themselves are the

promoters or instigators of a safe and participative digital world.

With this perspective, the participants in the Day of general discussion formulated the following recommendations:

- The areas concerned should ensure that children are listened to and that their point of view is taken into account;
- Laws and policies that will develop should be based on evidence;
- Areas concerned should ensure assistance and support that include mechanisms of accusation and telephone lines of friendly help for children, in order to provide security in the digital media.

FMSI participated in the Day of general discussion represented by the members of its office in Geneva, and it presented two documents, one in the name of UMBRASIL (União Marista do Brasil) and another one in the name of the Pontifical University of Salamanca (Spain).

## **SUBMISSION OF REPORTS for the Universal Periodic Review**

In 2014 FMSI submitted reports to the United Nations for the Universal Periodic Review (UPR) of the following states:

- Bolivia
- Chile
- Italy
- Madagascar

The reports were submitted to the UN Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights, in the framework of a process which involves a review of the human rights records of all UN Member States every four and a half years.

The process provides the opportunity for each State under review to declare what actions they have taken to improve human rights situations in their countries and to fulfil their human rights obligations. At the same time, it allows the delegations of other Member States to make “recommendations” and suggest further steps for the country in question.

In its reports on Bolivia, Chile, Italy and Madagascar, FMSI formulated recommendations regarding the rights of children. As always, FMSI insisted on the right to education, on child labor, street children, training of teachers, on avoiding discrimination in schools, on the promotion of a healthy life style among adolescents, on sexual abuse, access to education, on the trafficking of human beings and sexual tourism.

FMSI maintains the hope that the recommendations



contained in its reports, when accepted by governments, will contribute to improving the conditions of children in the countries mentioned, promoting a change of legislation, the introduction of favorable policies, the allocation of sufficient resources for the protection and development of minors. FMSI believes that this could produce lasting positive effects for the well-being of children.

FMSI relied on the FMSI Cono Sur Office and the link persons, its local contact people, to generate a draft report on children's issues within their region. Without their collaboration, we would not have been able to use the UN mechanism of the Universal Periodic Review in such an effective way.

### **LOBBYING the permanent missions of the states in Geneva**

At the presentation of the reports for the Universal Periodic Review (UPR) of Bolivia, Chile, Italy and Madagascar, pressure was put on the permanent diplomatic missions of several countries of the UNO,

in Geneva. This is because the recommendations contained in the reports, if adopted by the participating States, will become binding for the country and be subject to examination.

For FMSI and other NGO's to exercise pressure on the United Nations is a fundamental part of the process to assure that topics of interest or concern are taken into account during the debate on the country submitted to examination.

The lobbying activity is begun at least one month before the date of the examination, due to the fact that the adoption of a position by a state requires time and consultations between the capital of the state, its embassy in the state which is the object of the UPR and the institutions in Geneva. In order to obtain the results, the person carrying out the lobbying enters into contact with the delegates who are in charge of the Universal Periodical Revision of the Council of Human Rights. In order to facilitate the lobbying of the NGO's, UPR info – an accredited organism with ECOSOC – organizes "preliminary sessions" in Geneva among the NGO's and the States under revision.

### 3. ACTIVITIES WITH POLITICAL IMPACT

#### PARTICIPATION OF CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS in the Agenda Post 2015

The participation of girls, boys and adolescents is one of the rights that FMSI wants to promote. We are convinced that children and adolescents have valuable opinions to contribute. In this sense, the organizations of the World Movement for Children (MMI-LAC), developed programmes to ensure that the voices of children and adolescents be taken into account in the discussion of the Objectives of Development Post 2015.

In 2014 a friendly version of the report was drawn up with the 17 “Objectives of Sustainable Development” defined by the Open Working Group of the United Nations. This version of the document was translated into English, French, Icelandic, Russian, Portuguese, Arabic, German and Chinese, in order to make it known in different continents. The Coordinator of FMSI Cono Sur participated in its editing. During the month of October a consultation was carried out in 10 countries of Latin America: Mexico, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, El Salvador, Guatemala, Brazil, Uruguay, Colombia, Peru and Chile. Of the 17 Objectives, the 1,080 children and adolescents who participated, indicated that the most important are: 1<sup>st</sup> To end Poverty, 2<sup>nd</sup> To end hunger, 3<sup>rd</sup> To promote a healthy life, 4<sup>th</sup> To provide quality Education and 5<sup>th</sup> To live in Peace. 447 of the children who participated represented FMSI: 30 from San Salvador (El Salvador), 32 from Montevideo (Uruguay), 25 from Bogota (Colombia), 198 from Chile and 162 from Mexico.

The summary of the reflections was made known in key events such as the Pan American Congress of Children, with the senior people involved in human rights in MERCOSUR, in visits to the chanceries and permanent missions, and in the events that are held in the headquarters of the

United Nations, in New York, where a young student from the Champagnat School of Villa Alemana (Chile) was present.

## VI WORLD CONGRESS for the Rights of Childhood and Adolescence

From the 12<sup>th</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup> of November the VI World Congress for the Rights of Childhood and Adolescence was held in Puebla (Mexico). The topics presented by specialists in the rights of children referred especially to themes such as autonomy, family diversity, and the management of social networks. Experts from the world participated in the Congress, during the celebration of 25 years of the Convention on the Rights of the Child. FMSI was represented by a person from its office in Geneva.

In a similar way the Congress of Children and Adolescents took place. This was an event which Mexican Marists representing FMSI facilitated. FMSI contributed financially to this event.

At this event the children and adolescents who participated had the opportunity to speak, to play and to discuss on rights; they had other activities such as workshops or philosophy for children and a consultation on investment in childhood.

## XXI PAN AMERICAN CONGRESS in Brasilia

From the beginning of the XX century the countries of Latin America have been getting together at a certain period of time to evaluate and forecast the situation of children in the continent. This is the highest level of decision-making in the Inter-American Institute of the Child (IIN), an organism depending on the Organization of the American States (OEA). In 2014 the representatives of 26 countries met together between the 10<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> of December in Brasilia (Brazil).

During the previous months steps had been taken to try to get the recommendations of the civil society included in the resolutions of this Congress, centered on the theme: "Violence against children and adolescents. At 25 years of the Convention on the Rights of the Child: constructing environments of peace". During the Congress there was a parallel meeting in the headquarters of UMBRASIL (Marist Union of Brazil), between representatives of MMI-LAC, Rosa Maria Ortiz from O.E.A. and the Special Representative of the United Nations on violence against Children, Martha Santos Pais. Representatives from Marist Brazil and from FMSI (the team from the Geneva office), together with other organizations of the continent, dialogued on the inclusion of the directives to protect the rights of children and adolescents in the Agenda Post 2015.

## FMSI COORDINATION OFFICE FOR THE CONO SUR REGION

On the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the promulgation of the Convention on the Rights of the Child by the General Assembly of the United Nations, the XXI General Chapter of the Marist Institute (2009) challenged the Brothers “to convert themselves into experts and defenders of children and youth in a courageous and prophetic manner in the public forums”. Five years later, the commemoration of the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this important international treaty was a good moment to move forward on the impact on national politics. In the month of March 2014 the first meeting of FMSI Cono Sur was held in Santiago de Chile. This was an occasion to share and strengthen what the Marists have been doing in favor of the rights of children in Argentina, Bolivia, Chile, Paraguay, Peru and Uruguay.

As part of this process, in the month of May, through FMSI Cono Sur, the Foundation incorporated itself into the “World Movement for the Children in Latin America and the Caribbean” (MMI – LAC). This is an important coalition of international organizations that work in the promotion and defense of the human rights of children and youth. This is an unsurpassable opportunity to bind ourselves with other organisms which are attentive to situations such as violence against boys and girls, the agenda of the United Nations juvenile penal justice, migrant children, among others.

Since 2013 FMSI has been developing its institutional activity in the region of the “Southern Cone” through its office in Santiago de Chile: FMSI Cono Sur. From there, it coordinates and collaborates with the representatives of Marist and non-Marist organizations, national and international, and dialogues with the representatives of these institutions.

## 4. EDUCATION AND TRAINING IN CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

### FMSI- ASIA BRANCH

FMSI-Asia Branch coordinated the Foundation's activities in Asia, in dialogue with the Marist administrative units of South Asia (India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka), East Asia (Korea, Hong Kong, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore, Japan) and the Marist District of Asia (Bangladesh, Cambodia, India, Thailand, Viet Nam). The Office was created in March 2013 with the signing of a memorandum of Agreement by FMSI and the Marist Asia Conference, which represents the above mentioned administrative units.

It was intended primarily to assist the Marist missions' project management, fundraising, and the promotion of children's rights, but very soon it also became a logistics center for training activities in the area, and for the implementation of child protection policies.

### TRAINING IN THE RIGHTS OF CHILDREN

In 2014 FMSI, through its office in Geneva, organized days of training and seminars on the Convention on the Rights of the Child and the mechanisms of protection and defense of human rights, of the United Nations, addressed to Religious, facilitators, educators of the Institute of the Marist Brothers. In particular,

- FMSI was present in the various courses of formation of the Brothers in the Marist Centers of spirituality of El Escorial (Spain) for Spanish-speaking religious men, and of Manziana (Rome) for English-speaking religious men. The Marist themselves completed their formation with a visit to the headquarters of the United Nations in Geneva.
- Information sessions were organized in the Marist International Center (MIC), in Nairobi, in Kenya, for the young Marists in formation.

The Foundation carried out seminars for the defense and promotion of the rights of minors at the regional level of Asia, through its office for Asia (in Bangkok, Thailand). From here it collaborated with the key people of the Marist Administrative Units to carry out activities of planning or programming (study in practicability, the search for financing, monitoring) and of training on advocacy and on policies of protection of children, In relation to this last point FMSI has carried out:

- Training in the rights of children and protection against abuses was given in 15 schools in General Santos City (Philippines, August-September 2014). This training has involved the principals of the schools, the teachers and representatives of the students, that is a total number of 160 people.
- Training in the rights of children for 35 educators and those responsible for social centers from 16 countries of Asia (March, Bangkok, Thailand). Thanks to that, these workers have strengthened



their activities in favor of underprivileged children and have created a network in the region for the defense of the rights of minors.

The booklet was distributed in the Marist world during Advent, as a help for personal reflection, and in Marist schools as a means of thinking about participation as a right of minors. It was seen as an instrument for personal growth and of social change.

## DEVELOPMENT OF CHILD PROTECTION POLICIES in the Marist world

FMSI received from the Marist Institute the mandate to coordinate the development of the policies of protection of minors in the Marist Administrative Units, continuing the work of the ad hoc Commission of the Institute for the protection of children. During the year FMSI identified the key people of each Administrative Unit, to prepare for a meeting to discuss and exchange good practices. The FMSI-Asia Branch collaborated in the editing and revision of child protection policies to be adopted in the Administrative Units and the Marist educational structures of Asia.

## RAISING AWARENESS

FMSI produced a small publication entitled “Children’s Right to Participation”. It contains statements of children on their experiences of participation, sets out extracts of texts from institutions and organizations of the United Nations.

## 5. OUR PROJECTS

### PROFESSIONAL TRAINING FOR THE YOUNG PEOPLE OF MAULA PRISON

- Marist Brothers and Misean Cara (Ireland)
- Lilongwe, Malawi
- 55,500 Euros

We have previously worked in this professional-training project for the young detainees in this prison. In the course of 2014 the project was completed and is about to begin functioning at full capacity. The following is an extract from the report sent to FMSI at the beginning of 2015 by Br. Fernand Dostie, the head of the project.

“The building of Maula Prison dedicated to the school (the Basic Skills) is practically complete. There only remains the setting up of the steel shelves in the warehouses and the tables in the room to be used as the tailor’s shop, because – it seems unbelievable – we cannot manage to get bolts or screws: they have been blocked at the border for weeks. As soon as we are able to release them we will be able to finish the fitting up of everything and the structure will be complete.

In the meantime, we have begun to use the building. In fact, the school has already been officially recognized as a Training Center by TEVET (Technical, Entrepreneurial and Vocational Education and Training) and also as a Test Centre by the Ministry of Labour and Commerce. Officials from the Ministry come to Maula Prison to hold the exams.

One of the detainees teaches masonry or brickwork to a group of 15

colleagues. In a few days time they will be able to use the large room for practice and, once they are judged ready by one of the guards who has a Grade 1 Masters in construction, the charge for exam (5000 Malawian Kwacha for each one) will be paid and the officials of the Ministry of Labour will come for the English written exam and the practical exam.

Eight of the 15 apprentices have already presented themselves for the 3<sup>rd</sup> level in brickwork; four passed in the written exam and the practical test and seven only the practical test, while only one failed. After this experience, we have decided to open a school of literacy for 51 students. At the beginning over 200 registered but because of lack of teaching personnel we have been able to take only about 50 at a time. Next September these will be integrated into the elementary school and we will be able to dedicate ourselves to the others.

One of our difficulties is the lack of personnel for supervision, and for this reason we cannot teach things which need the use of the metal instruments given to us by TEVET. Those objects could be used as weapons and become dangerous, especially in the overcrowded cells. Together with the officials responsible for the prison we hope to employ an adequate number of supervisory personnel in order to guarantee the full development of all the school activities.

Next week I will have a meeting with two construction companies which are ready to train two members of the personnel in woodwork and carpentry in such a way that they can be in charge of the teaching and the organization of the Training Center. The Director is already selecting the persons concerned”.

## **ST. MARCELLIN HIGH SCHOOL FOR THE DALIT BOYS OF MANGAMANUTHU**

- **Marist Brothers, Italian Bishops' Conference and Misean Cara (Ireland)**
- **Mangamanuthu, India**
- **100,000 Euros**

The Marist Brothers have been in India since 1974, specifically in a State in the south called Tamil Nadu. From the beginning they have dedicated themselves to the poorest or marginalized boys, particularly to those of the Dalit social caste (the Untouchables), which is particularly widespread in the region. The Dalits live grouped in small villages, in rural areas where they dedicate themselves to agriculture, enough for survival, but frequently made more difficult during the dry season.

The Marist Brothers are committed, as always in educational activity, to doing everything possible to guarantee assistance to these boys and a high level of instruction. And it is precisely their dedication and the scholastic results obtained by the boys of their schools that has aroused particular attention

regarding them.

The Marists started with the project "Operation Rainbow", assisting the boys and families affected by AIDS in the city and the surroundings of Tiruchirappalli (known also as Trichy). They then created an important educational center with a primary and secondary school in Udayapatty. In 1999 they were called by the Bishop of Dindigul in Mangamanuthu, to direct and administer the St. James R.C. Middle School, a historical school in the Diocese which was about to celebrate its centenary. In the years 2003-2006 the school center was re-structured: in addition to the Primary School (from first to fifth grade) - then returned to the responsibility of the Diocese, with the name of Red Cross Primary School - the Middle School became a complete secondary school with classes nine and ten, and took the name of St. Marcellin High School.

At present it has approximately 600 pupils from about sixty villages around the area of Mangamanuthu. What is surprising are the results of the national examination at the end of the tenth class. Normally 100% of the pupils pass with very high marks. The result is particularly impressive when it is realized that many of the pupils belong to the Dalit caste and

therefore are considered inferior and as a result are socially marginalized...

The project of which FMSI took charge in 2014, served to extend the secondary school to classes 11 and 12, introducing the “Higher Secondary School”, adding new classrooms and above all laboratories for science and computer science or informatics in order to give teaching of a higher standard. Normally, in fact, the schools for the poor are of a very low quality and far away from the villages. Only education can allow the opportunity to get out of the vicious circle of poverty and marginalization.

For the Marist Brothers the completion of this

school was an absolute priority since their arrival to Mangamanuthu. After some provisional arrangements, with classrooms under thatch roofs, this is a dream come true for them and for the people of the area. Moreover, the project is perfectly integrated into the diocesan plan for the promotion of Dalit boys, particularly numerous in that territory.

The PTA (Parents & Teachers Association), has also been very important; it was able to involve local political representatives who made themselves responsible for a grant for the science laboratories and for the salary of four teachers. It is a matter of importance politically, because the Hindu local Government has understood that it is only by putting together public and private resources that relevant social results can be obtained. The area is Hindu in its majority, with a good presence of Christians, but in the school and also in the local population life together is peaceful and natural.

The public grant does not solve the financial problems of the school, which cannot depend fully on the fees of the pupils because the majority of the families are peasants with very poor harvests and frequently have to face dry seasons. St. Marcellin School however, has created a fund for scholarships in favor of a certain number of students: it is a form of borrowing money that can be paid back in time or also repaid in kind by several useful services for the functioning of the

school. Other income will come from the renting of the classrooms for meetings and public events, as well as courses for adults and the use of the laboratories by people from outside.

## **TERRITORIAL INTERVENTION FOR THE PREVENTION OF EXPLOITATION OF MINORS**

- **Hogar Marist Community Educational Center**
- **Montevideo, Uruguay**
- **4,850 Euros**

The construction of a network of protection for children and the sensitizing of the younger ones to the dangers of work and sexual exploitation began with training seminars in which almost 40 persons participated representing 20 institutions of the territory, guided by professional specialists on the theme of the exploitation of minors.

The project concerns the eastern area of Montevideo and the Camino Maldonado, where child-labour and exploitation of minors are a concrete reality for children and young people. The

project was started in July 2014 with the support of the Marist Province of Cruz del Sur, in dialogue with local public and private institutions, especially the educational and health projects.

Besides the input and group work, information was collected directly from children and young people for a first survey of the child-labour. This is an important piece of work, when it is considered that no information exists nor has there been any type of investigation into this problem in the area of Montevideo in which the Hogar Marist Educational Center is situated.

## **NOT ONE LESS – IMPULSE TO SCHOOLING IN WESTERN AFRICA**

- **Marist Brothers**
- **Bouaké, Ivory Coast**
- **2,500 Euros**

47 pupils (boys and girls) of the S. Marcellin Champagnat, Marist primary and secondary school in Bouaké, have received help that has allowed them to go to school for a year also enjoying the right to a meal.



The project was promoted by the Marist Mediterranean Province, with the objective of making possible the schooling of the children of families which have very few economic opportunities and to create a fund of scholarships for 4 countries of Western Africa: Ivory Coast, Ghana, Liberia, Cameroon, FMSI contributed to this general

project in collaboration with the Association of Former Pupils of San Leone Magno, the Marist School in Rome (Italy).

## TEACHING MATERIAL FOR THE CHILDREN OF THE TEA PLANTATIONS OF SREEMANGAL

- **Marist Brothers and St Joseph the Worker Parish**
- **Sreemangal (Moulvibazar), Bangladesh**
- **3,735 Euros**

600 children from 10 primary schools received everything necessary to go to school: notebooks, satchel or school bag, pens and pencils, uniform. The children come from the communities that have settled around the city of Sreemangal, the “tea capital” of Bangladesh, and they are the children of workers in the plantations, a marginalized and exploited minority. The Parish of Saint Joseph the Worker, with the help of missionaries, organized a network of 36 primary schools dispersed in the tea plantations, in order to give the children basic

instruction. The small project has already produced a positive effect: encouraged by the free distribution of materials and uniforms, the children registered in the 10 schools that have benefited have increased in 2015.

Besides, a profitable link with a project of Caritas was made, as the uniforms are made by local people who have followed courses in sewing offered by Caritas.

## PROFESSIONAL TRAINING FOR THE SOCIO-ECONOMIC PROMOTION OF SANTALI YOUTH

- **Marist Brothers and the Italian Bishops' Conference**
- **Talit, India**
- **29,000 Euros**

The region of Western Bengal is among the largest in the whole of India as regards the number of inhabitants. The majority of population is formed by young people. The Marist Brothers have been present in Western Bengal for some years in the rural area of Talit, about 100 km. from Kolkata, the capital city, where the presence of the Santali ethnic group is very

strong.

The Santali ethnic group is very numerous in India and has a history of virtue and courage for having fought against the British regime. In 1850 the Santali hero Sidhu, gathered around him 10,000 Santali people, instituting almost a parallel government to that of the British. In the past the Santali lived from the products of the forest, hunting and fishing. Today they continue to possess unique capabilities in the production of musical instruments, rugs and baskets made of intertwined plants. This tradition has been transmitted from one generation to the next, even if at present the majority of the Santali work in cultivating rice.

Many of them do not have their own land and work as farm laborers for less than 3 dollars a day. The children and young people from this ethnic group have great difficulty getting into formal schooling and they leave school without finishing their education. Parents do not encourage frequent schooling, because they themselves are illiterate and children and young people constitute a help in the daily activities of the family. But by abandoning school the young lose every opportunity of finding work different from that of a farm laborer and of improving their economic situation, thus improving themselves socially. Many of the young, no longer finding themselves within the Santali tradition and, at the same time, not being able to insert themselves into society, become lost and dependent on drugs and alcohol.

From this the Marist Brothers project for the creation of a professional training center for Santali young people was born. In collaboration with FMSI and with the contribution of the Italian Episcopal Conference, the center wants to offer training to 360 young people a year, boys and girls, in various professional courses which will give them the opportunity of finding work or beginning a trade of their own, getting out of the situation of poverty and marginalization.

The center was established in an already existing building in the Diocese of Asansol called "Talit College". Some of the areas were adapted in order to

hold the courses. The topics chosen for training are: tailoring and sewing, repairing furniture, mechanical engineering, repairing of bicycles, digital printing, welding, carpentry, installation of solar energy equipment.

It was decided to start the first phase with only three courses: tailoring and sewing, English language and computer science or informatics. The latter two courses are applicable to all the professional sectors and tailoring is the course that permits insertion into the world of work more rapidly than the others. These courses were chosen carefully to give girls access to training. In addition, the parents of the young people were involved in the project through awareness activities and direct participation in the work of adaptation of the Talit College classrooms.

After three years of the center's functioning, it is planned to carry out an evaluation of the courses and of the real labor movement. Talit is a small center and far away from the city, so the professional sectors may soon be filled up. Structures were organized in this way in order to be able to easily modify the courses.

Another element considered was economic sustainability, because the young Santali people are not able to pay the cost of their training. So it is necessary to ask the Government for recognition of the center and then organize activities to sell products made by the tailors and other services in order to gain income with which to finance the costs of the center. Together with Br. Alex Arockiasamy, who is responsible for the project, we congratulate the first group of young people who began their training!

### **'HEART WITHOUT FRONTIERS' SOCIAL CENTER: FOR EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT**

- **Corazon sin Fronteras Center**
- **Athens, Greece**
- **5,000 Euros**

25 children of primary school age were accepted in to the center directed by the Marist Brothers of the "Corazón sin fronteras" Association in Acharnés, in the suburbs of Athens. Acharnés is a marginalized

area marked by unemployment, poverty, family disintegration, frequent occurrences in places which are areas of massive and rapid immigration.

The center of the Marist Brothers offers children an environment where they can study and play every afternoon during the school year; a protected and healthy environment, a place of encounter for educational, social and cultural and sports activities. Specifically, in 2014, the activities of the center were: individual and group educational support, computer science, singing, music, excursions, football, basketball and volley ball.

## HEALTH CENTRE

- **Marist Solidarity Cambodia**
- **O'chet Pram (Pailin), Cambodia**
- **3,500 Euros**

110 children and their families received basic medical assistance in the Center installed by Marist Solidarity Cambodia in O'chet Pram, near Pailin.

The illnesses most frequently found have been discovered: gastritis, diarrhea, typhoid fever, malnutrition, vaginitis, hypertension, myalgia, infections of the skin and respiratory and urinary tracts. The more serious cases were sent to Battambang and Phnom Penh for specialist attention.

Three people work in the center, as volunteers: a doctor, a midwife and a driver. The staff, besides rendering service in the center at O'chet Pram, visit the families in the surrounding villages twice a week and give courses on hygiene and health once a month.

The center enjoys the permission of the local health authority.



## PROGRAM OF EDUCATIONAL AND PSYCHO-SOCIAL ASSISTANCE AFTER THE EBOLA EPIDEMIC

- **Marist Brothers**
- **Monrovia, Liberia**
- **3,170 Euros**

The year 2014 will be remembered for the epidemic of the Ebola virus, an epidemic without precedent because of the territorial extent, the number of those affected, and of the victims. Since March 2014, the month in which the first cases of Ebola were officially confirmed in the forest region of Guinea Conakry, the epidemic spread until it reached the neighbouring countries of Liberia and Sierra Leone, with a limited number of cases in Senegal, Mali, Nigeria and, with a separate block in the Democratic Republic of Congo. 15,000 cases were registered and more than 5,000 deaths in the three countries most seriously affected, among which Liberia was the most affected. For the first time, the epidemic did not remain confined to rural villages, but it spread to the large cities and the capitals, rendering the control, the identification of cases and the identification of the chain of infection even more difficult.

The Marist Brothers of Monrovia, who for years have directed and administered one of the schools of the city, the Sr. Shirley Kolmer Memorial Catholic School, launched the alarm after having closed the school, and asked FMSI for help for the poorest families of the area of Barnersville and the organizing of activities for prevention against the spread of the virus.

FMSI responded by supporting an emergency program in collaboration with the Spanish NGO SED, which oversaw:

- a) The supplying of a large basket of food to the poorest families of the community of Barnersville;
- b) A program of infection prevention with visits from house to house by trained personnel: training in prevention of the spread the Ebola virus, distribution of chlorine and other material for protection, collecting information on the situation and on the level of the risk of spread.

The financial support to the poorest families to buy food was made necessary after the block of

commercial exchanges had rendered the cost of essential goods unaffordable. There was also a crisis in the production of commercial crops, for example palm oil, rubber, cacao, on which the survival and the purchasing power of many families depended. With this activity 60 families, with a total number of 300 persons, were reached, of this number the majority being children. Thanks to the supplying of food it was not only possible to satisfy basic needs, but the moving of the people was stopped, which would have increased the risk of infection.

The program then concentrated on prevention activity that in the absence of a cure or vaccination, is the only way to hold back and avoid the spread of the sickness, especially in the neighborhoods where the population is very dense. Awareness raising was provided for from house to house and in busy public places, by means of local facilitators who explained the virus and the preventive measures and distributed hygiene-sanitary kits to facilitate the adoption of the necessary measures. With this activity 1,200 persons were reached. As Br. Anthony Siryeh, who is responsible for the project, said: "The program has permitted the families in greater difficulty to continue to live a normal life and to play an active part in the prevention of the spread of the virus as an alternative to spreading panic. People have felt that they have been helped and have been able to act as a lever on their resources to help the community".

FMSI remains at the side of the Marist Brothers of Monrovia and of the community affected by the virus of Ebola with a new program directed to the schools and to communities.

## 6. FINANCIAL REPORT

The report is based on the financial statements available in FMSI Office. It gives an account of the sums collected by the Foundation, and their use in 2014. Some brief notes are given to help in interpreting the figures. Notice that in this report is also given information on the projects in which FMSI has contributed to carry out collaborating in seeking financing, directly in favor of the counterparts or partners in loco (contributions of third parties).

### INCOME

**Donations from the Founder:** the General House of the Marist Brothers of the Schools is the Founder of FMSI and its principal donor. Apart from the amounts the General House grants the Foundation each year, consideration must be given to the free allocation of rooms and services, as well as the provision of personnel.

**Donations from individuals:** this applies to the amounts received, directly or through the Marist Provinces and institutions, from friends and benefactors of the Foundation who wish to contribute to its projects and programs for the benefit of children.

**Donations from agencies:** this corresponds to the funding received from private organizations for carrying out specific projects.

**Public contributions:** “5x1000” that the Italian taxpayers can allocate for an organization with a social utility purpose.

**Revenues from financial activities:** the heading refers mainly to the results of the financial management of the patrimony of the Foundation.

### EXPENDITURE

**Financing of projects:** money disbursed by the Foundation for projects or scholarships for disadvantaged students

**Activities to promote and protect the rights of the child:** expenses incurred by the Foundation for working at the United Nations in Geneva, advocating and lobbying for children’s rights.



**Expenses connected with institutional activities:** this corresponds to the operating costs in the carrying out of activities related to the projects and the advocacy for child rights.

**Operating expenses:** expenses associated with the ordinary running of the offices of the Foundation. The figure does not include the headquarters location, the services and emoluments of the personnel made available freely by the Founder, as a supplementary contribution towards carrying out the Foundation’s objectives.



Children of a school in Sreemangal (Bangladesh) wearing the new uniforms.






